A View from the Porch...

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"The Lord is risen!" He is risen indeed!" Allelujia! These are the words with which we greet each other on Easter Sunday. It is a day of rejoicing! After all, it is the Day of Resurrection! Yet, the opening acclamation of worship that first Easter morning was not a joyful, "Alleluia."

All four gospel writers tell us that the first Easter was emotionally overwhelming. Yet, as dawn breaks early Easter morning, it is not unbridled joy and rejoicing that dominate the story as much as words like fear or trembling, afraid or frightened that appear in one form or



another. The words amazed, perplexed, astonished also drench the emotional landscape with weeping, running, and fleeing. Why such a cacophony of troubling emotions on such a day! Where is the joy? Where is the hope?

Among all the gospel writers, nobody captures the fear and trembling that accompanied Jesus' resurrection more than Matthew. While the word "joy" is found in Matthew's account of the resurrection once, "fear," or some derivative of the word is found four times. Furthermore, the only time joy is mentioned is in combination with fear as the women, "hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy ..." (Matt. 28:8)

Yes, the Lord is risen, but as Tom Long says, "a shattering earthquake rippled a seismic shock through history and signaled that the fault lines of human history had shifted dramatically toward grace and hope." We've heard this quaking before, both at Jesus' crucifixion, and at the storm at sea.

The rumbling of the earthquake is the sound of God interrupting the way things have always been done, God's dramatic intervention, disrupting the ways the dots have always connected – fear, death, grief and being shaken at their very foundations. Then an angel appears, rolling back the stone, and sits on it like he's sitting on a park bench, enjoying the early morning light as the sun rises. His appearance strikes terror in those who would guard the places of death and fear and sorrow in this world both unleashing a whole new world of hope to those who hear his words, "Do not be afraid" and shattering the powers that would rob us of courage, hope, and joy.

Matthew tells the story with all the bells and whistles with the intention to get us to understand what a world changing experience it was. It was scary and exciting. Most scary things are exciting. One can hardly begin to understand the emotions they experienced. To say it blew their mind would be an understatement. Earthquakes, a moving boulder, a "terrifying" angel, and the earth shattering message that fear has been banished, for Jesus is alive and has gone before them. Fear and joy, despair and hope, doubt and faith, these are the two sides of our lives in this world. But in the end we have heard the resurrection promise that joy, hope, and faith will ultimately prevail.

On this Easter Sunday, and everyone to follow, fear is not the last word. So, remember the words of great theologian Bob the Tomato who said it best: "God is bigger than the Boogeyman." Fear will not end, but it does not have to overwhelm us. Fear will not stop, but it does not have to destroy us. Fear is not the last word! Along with the cross of Friday, there is the empty tomb of Sunday. Along with the pain and death, there is Resurrection. Along with the fear, there is great joy. For the Lord is Risen! He is Risen, indeed! Let all God's people say, *Alleluia! "Alleluia*, may not be the first word of Easter morning, but it is both the last and the best word for us all.

Easter Egg Hunt




Brunch with a Bunch

Leading up to and throughout these events you can:


- Look back at the last five decades and share in our dreams for the next half century through a time-line banner displayed in the narthex.

Concerts from Kirkwood

On March 12, Concerts from Kirkwood will present its third concert of the current season, as we welcome the *Beau Soir Ensemble* in a concert that will have a Celtic flair as we recognize the arrival of spring (I'm ready... how about you?) and St. Patrick's Day. The ensemble, consisting of harp, flute, and viola perform frequently in the local area and will surprise you with their versatility and variety of the music they'll perform.

The season will end with a return performance by the *Washington Saxophone Quartet* on May 7. The quartet will perform a concert featuring not only jazz favorites but also an eclectic mix of styles and genres. The quartet is celebrating their fortieth year of highly successful performances in the broader Washington area and is the most widely heard saxophone quartet in the United States. They appear frequently on National Public Radio and have numerous recordings to their credit.

Concerts from Kirkwood has been very fortunate to have been sought out by not only local, but also national and international artists. These artists, many of whom are widely recognized on the international stage actually ask to perform for our series. Why? It's because of the reputation of our series for quality and the stated goal of our church to bring quality music to the community as our gift to our neighbors.

This highly effective community outreach effort has brought literally hundreds of people to our building and offered the opportunity for us to interact with them. They enjoy the physical beauty of our sanctuary as well as the outstanding acoustic quality of the space. As we host the audience at a meet-the-artists reception after each concert, we have the opportunity to speak with them to create overwhelmingly positive impressions of our church, its members, and its place in the community. That's the positive side of the equation. Unfortunately, we do not take the best advantage of these opportunities as a relatively small number of our members attend the concerts and help welcome our guests. We have a loyal core of members who attend and contribute to the receptions and the management of the series, but we need more support for each concert.

Concerts from Kirkwood is funded entirely by contributions from those who attend and from the generous support of a number of supporters within and outside of the church. It receives no support from the church's operating budget. The concerts present a wide variety of music and artists, and present an outstanding opportunity to expose children to good music and to help build in them an appreciation of the arts. I'd invite each of you to attend and support the series. Beyond the chance to serve in this ministry of Kirkwood, you're sure to enjoy the music and the fellowship.
