A View from the Porch...

"It's the most wonderful time of the year..." so begins a popular song of the Christmas season. What makes Christmastime such a wonderful time? Why is there a certain magic in the air? Why are people a little more kind, generous, and caring as Christmas approaches?

As a people of faith, we would say that the birth of Jesus, God's beloved Son and our Savior is the answer to such questions. When the prophet Isaiah foresaw the coming of the Lord's Messiah nearly seven hundred years before his birth he wrote saying,

host host whost time of the offere

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6 NIV)

These ancient words were written to a people without hope, barely surviving in the darkness of captivity; a people for whom, "Have yourself a merry little Christmas" would be an almost cold and callous greeting. The message of any of our popular Christmas jingles pales in comparison to the plight of God's people offering little consolation to a people without any tangible hope for their future, a people dejected and feeling God-forsaken.

Don't get me wrong for I enjoy many of the popular traditional Christmas songs as do many of you. "White Christmas", "Silver Bells", "The Christmas Song" and many others are among my favorites. And though they try to capture the "wonder" of Christmas, they fail to fulfill in any way the vision of the prophet to his heart broken people.

Advent is a time of preparation, and as such, its messengers are often digging around in places we would prefer left untouched in our lives. To experience authentic wonder as Christmas approaches may mean that we learn to hear the "good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people" in a new context. We need to hear these words spoken amid the world's most wretched places— in and among the poor, oppressed, and God-forsaken throughout our world. Born in obscurity, born in poverty, born in vulnerability, the Christ is born. And Isaiah tells us...

Of the increase of his government and peace there will be no end.

He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom,
establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness from that time on and forever.

The zeal of the LORD Almighty will accomplish this.

(Isaiah 9:7 NIV)

And the wonder is just this! And this, the world's greatest joy...

As we prepare to encounter the astounding wonder of Christ's advent; as our hearts grow tender and lives more generous; let's beware the tendency to become sentimental about the season and to get caught up in "being in the Christmas spirit". Rather, let us worship Christ the newborn King. Let us work to bring Jesus' gifts of justice, hope, and the wonders of his love into the far reaches of this weary world to a people just as desperate, dejected, and forgotten as those to whom Isaiah spoke and among whom Jesus was born to save.


















Previews from the Pulpit

Some of the most wonderfully written and memorable stories are told and retold as Christmas draws near each year—Dicken's *A Christmas Carol*, O'Henry's *Gift of the Magi*, *Moore's The Night before Christmas*—just to name a few. 


Book Club


Wednesday Evening Bible Study (WEBS)






Christmas Joy Offering "Thanks be to God for this indescribable gift!" 2 Corinthians 9:15

The Christmas Joy Offering, a Presbyterian tradition since the 1930's, celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ, the truly "indescribable gift," as well as the gifts of church leaders – past, present and future. Through the work of the Christmas Joy Offering, we seek the living of this truth: that God's generosity is the source, the support and the outcome of our own. We give because God has freely given. We give to support the needs of our church leaders.

This year Kirkwood will celebrate the Christmas Joy Offering on **Sunday, December 24**. The Christmas Joy Offering is one of four special offerings for the Presbyterian Church (USA). Gifts contributed to this offering provide financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian Church workers and support leadership and education at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges. What does this look like?

- \$1.1 million of gifts from 2016 are being used to provide critical financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their time of need.
- Supplements from the Board of Pensions (BOP) helped more than 211 households remain in their homes, afford assisted living, or long-term care.
- Income supplements from the BOP helped nearly 291 households, assisting retired church workers and surviving spouses with the means to provide for themselves.
- Shared and Emergency Grants from the BOP helped more than 110 households facing times of great financial need or uncertainty due to unforeseen circumstances.
- \$1 million of gifts from 2016 are being used to provide education and leadership development skills at Presbyterian-related racial ethnic schools and colleges.
